## What Being Tall Means to Me

It's just another typical day, or rather, another stereotypical day in the life of a tall person. This stereotype, the fixed and often oversimplified image of tall people, is socially acceptable and widely recognized everywhere, and I do not escape it. I get bombarded with questions nonstop, asking about my height, what sport I play, and what living tall is all about. When asked about sports, instead of answering that I play basketball or volleyball, I sometimes respond with miniature golf instead as a joke and I get a surprised reaction because my answer doesn't fit the stereotype.

Of course there are disadvantages to being tall. As a child I envied my 6'9" uncle, and always told Dad I wanted to be as tall as him. He responded by saying that this is not a tall world, and as I grew to 6'7" I came to realize the truth in his statement. It is a major struggle to find clothes to fit such unusual proportions, and finding a car with enough headroom and legroom is like winning the lottery. Everyone automatically assumes I am great at sports just because of my height, but it took sixteen years to actually grow into my body. Before, my arms and legs often seemed to do their own thing on impulse, sending me sprawling or chasing after a missed ball, so I have had to learn to laugh at myself. I get asked for lots of height-related favors, fixing lights and hoops and getting that last item off the top shelf, and I am happy to help. Some people cringe when I describe these 'struggles', wondering how I live with them, but I would not trade my height for the world.

My height essentially makes up my character. Yes, there are some nice perks and advantages to being tall, but I value my height because it means much more than that to me. The advantages are only the surface, while the implications are endless. Upon seeing me, the first thing others notice is that I am very tall, and they look up to me both literally and figuratively. I am initially respected because of it, and because my character is so visible, I strive each day to maintain that respect. My height is by no means a source of entitlement, or a reason to have a condescending attitude towards shorter people. Instead, it is a source of confidence for me and a significant part of my development into a leader. I was shy through middle school, but blossomed in high school in part due to my height being a point of recognition. This led to me being more recognizable, connected, and involved, part of the foundation that I use to become a leader. My gift of being tall has helped me with success in sports, which teaches me the valuable lessons of a strong work ethic, sportsmanship, and perseverance.

The distinct advantages and opportunities presented by my height have shaped my character and have been crucial in my development as a leader. It isn't just my body that is tall and large, but my presence and personality as well. Being tall does not make me better than the next person, but personally I would never give it up because it has become my character.

# **Upcoming TCI Events**

## 2014 TCI Delegates' Meeting

Greetings to my tall fellow STC members.

This year at the TCI convention in Washington DC, yours truly will be the STC delegate at the TCI delegates meeting. As I peruse the proposed by-law and resolution changes I don't see anything that I suspect will bring up any heated debates this year. The agenda has still yet to be finalized. I will summarize what changes are proposed. If you want to see the full changes, please see the links at the bottom of this article to find the on-line version.

There are seven proposed by-law changes:

- 1. Will remove the requirement that club newsletters to be sent to TCI. Since most clubs no longer produce a newsletter, this was deemed as unnecessary.
- 2. Better defines the definition of Associate club members from a TCI standpoint. Many clubs have differing definitions and this will let those clubs keep those viewpoints and clarifies those members from the TCI view.
- 3. Cleans up a minor change in how a line item in the budget is defined
- 4. Changes the wording of the Finance Officer's duty to set up budgets from leadership to TCI office holders.
- 5. Moves a set of written duties from the alternate treasure's list of duties to the Treasurer's duties
- 6. Gives a deadline for publication and distribution of the annual delegates meeting of September.
- 7. Clarifies how approved by-law and resolution changes are checked for accuracy and timely posting.

Most of the proposed resolutions are based on the queen's pageant. Read them below.

- 1. Changes the rules so that there must be at least three queen candidates for there to be a pageant at any convention.
- 2. Makes it possible for members who want to run for queen from a club that does not sponsor a queen or a member at large to be able to run for queen.
- 3. Changes the rules for who may be a judge at a queen pageant so that certain TCI members may judge in the pageant.
- 4. Excess proceeds from a queen pageant will be added to the convention proceeds and directed to TCI
- Adds some ordering information for the crown and sash to the by-laws for ease of ordering
- 6. Clarifies who can participate in TCI convention sporting events.
- 7. Changes the name from *the National Marfan Foundation* to *the Marfan Foundation* in the preferred charities section.

As you can see, it does not look like anything too earth shattering.
