David's essay:

"This just isn't going to work", my hairdresser muttered. She had lowered my chair as low as it could go, and still could not cut my hair. "You're going to have to slide down the chair, and slouch. A LOT." Sitting in that hair salon, slouching so that the hairdresser could cut my hair, was the first time I realized that I was really tall. I had gotten the cliché comments for years: "how's the weather up there?", "you're a giant!", and my personal favorite, "Wow! Where do you get clothes?" While I am no giant, the fact that I stand above 6'4" has been integral to my development and my identity. I am proud to say that being tall means much, much more than a measurement.

The comments and attention that accompany being tall are not terrible. In fact, they chronicle one of the greatest examples of what it means to be tall. Being tall means having a commanding presence. It denotes leadership. The fact that people literally and figuratively look up to me means that I have a responsibility to ensure that my height is just an accessory. This means that I should willingly and wholeheartedly be ready to help when someone can't reach something. When my teachers need me to turn on the projector, I jumped out of my seat. Likewise, when my mom needs a lightbulb changed, I change it happily. Adele Adkins said, "I'm a big personality. I walk into a room, big and tall and loud." To me being tall means that I don't have to be a big personality to be noticed. I don't have to be loud, because my stature already denotes my leadership and my obligation to use both my presence and my gangly frame to help those around me.

Being tall entails more than just reaching the top shelf though. When I was in first grade, I broke my femur in a trampoline accident. At the time I didn't realize the gravity of the situation. I recall my parents crying when the doctors told them that my broken leg could be stunted, which would be debilitating with my projected height. Luckily, my femur healed. I don't share this as a sob story. The fact of the matter is that I didn't even realize (or care, quite frankly) about my leg fracture when I was 9 years old. However, an experience like this helped me realize how truly blessed I am. Of course, my legs stick off the end of beds, and I have to custom order my pants. I even had to install a new shower head in my bathroom just so that I could bathe. But these are only the ostensible measures of my life as a tall person. Because of my leg fracture, I see the many blessings I have. I can see over crowds. February 11th - International Hug a Tall Person Day - is dedicated to people like me. Above all, I *always* get to sit in the front seat of a crowded car.

"Tall" is a broad word. There are many responsibilities that accompany being tall, but there is no "one-size-fits-all" definition of "tall ". I believe that being a tall man standing above those around you physically, but standing with those around you in all walks of life. One's height can be useful for getting rebounds in a basketball game or serving as an easily spotted tour guide, but it should be used to bring others to new heights. Today, when I get a haircut, I slouch without being asked. I slide down in the chair and make my best effort to accommodate the needs of my hairdresser. I understand that I have been blessed with a healthy and towering body. I can proudly say that "the weather up here" is just fine.



2017 TCI Convention Awards





The Great Reno Balloon Race

September 10, 2017

Rancho San Rafael Regional Park, Reno, NV

On Sunday September 10th, join Sue and Jim Morrison of the Sacramento Tall Club as they enjoy the largest free hotair ballooning event in the world.



(The races run September 8-10, but Sue and Jim are only hosting on the 10th.)

During three days in early September, you can look up into the Reno skies and see a rainbow of hot air balloons soaring about. From its humble beginnings in 1982 with just 20 balloons, The Great Reno Balloon Race has taken flight with up to 100 balloons each year. The idea was to create an event that would keep visitors in town the weekend between the State Fair and the Reno Air Races and 35 years later, it is known as a world-renowned, and locally, a beloved community tradition.

Taking place just a few miles north of downtown Reno, the event enchants both young and old with its vibrant colors and inspiring music. The Balloon Race has won many awards over the years including 'Best Special Event in Reno' and 'Best Special Event in Northern Nevada.' With an average of 120,000 spectators attending the event each year, the number of lives touched by the beautiful spectacle continues to rise just like the balloons themselves.

In the afternoon and evening you can stroll Virginia Street – Reno's answer to the Las Vegas "strip"; enjoy the Riverwalk District and Whitewater Park; shop at any number of unique locations; or visit the National Automobile Museum. Those wanting to step away from Reno might drive out to historic Virginia City and enjoy its entertaining mix of old saloons, museums and shopping; or up to beautiful Lake Tahoe for its clear waters and high-Sierra scenery. Or you could just take a nap: if you're going to see the Super Glow Show, you'll need it!


